CHARLOTTE CUMMINGS New Zealand

Charlotte Cummings hails from Aotearoa, New Zealand. She has had a varied professional background working across mental health, abuse, and harm investigations, and in consultancy roles for philanthropic trusts.

Charlotte has a strong drive to contribute to making the world a more just and merciful place to be, especially mindful of the experiences for future generations. She is interested in how we hold together the value of tangata (people) and whenua (land).

INTRODUCING THE MERCY WATER JUSTICE COALITION




As we approach World Water Day 2024, *Mercy Global Action is pleased to announce the launch of the Mercy Water Justice Coalition*, our commitment to the United Nations Water Action Agenda and our response to the growing commodification, degradation, and depletion of Earth's precious water sources.

The aim of this Coalition is to identify 'Mercy Water Leaders' in all regions of the Mercy World. Mercy Water Leaders will be individuals (over the age of 18) who have an identified interest in water issues and are motivated to work alongside the MGA team to create and implement a 'Water Action Agenda' within their Mercy community – whether it be a Mercy school, university, congregation, ministry, or other organisation.

Through their Water Action Agenda, they will commit to several actions which raise awareness of the multiple values of water and advocate for a rights-based approach to the implementation of Sustainable Development Goal #6: Clean Water & Sanitation.



We know that water has long been a focus for many Mercy communities, and so *our hope* is to consolidate these efforts, fostering a globally informed and unified 'Mercy voice' on water that is heard and valued at the United Nations...

THROUGH OUR ECOSOC LENS...

• Reflections on the 62nd Commission for Social Development & Civil Society Forum

As a member of the NGO Committee on Social Development, MGA was pleased to participate in this year's Commission on Social Development (CSocD62), focused on "fostering social development and social justice through social policies" to achieve the 2030 Agenda and the overarching goal of poverty eradication.

Almost 30 years on from the 1995 Copenhagen Declaration and just 6 years out from the conclusion of 2030 Agenda, CSocD62 was characterised by discussions on the future of social development, the necessity for a second World Social Summit, and the need for ambitious structural reforms that are rooted in social justice.

It was also marked by a strong civil society presence. MGA was delighted to attend the Civil Society Forum; a day set aside for civil society representatives to discuss challenges and best practices, raise the voices of those rendered vulnerable, and emphasise the inherent dignity and human rights of all. We also attended a series of side events, on topics ranging from homelessness, to women's land rights, to local experiences of SDG implementation.

It was a successful Commission, producing robust resolutions on several fronts, including the establishment of next year's theme, and an unexpected commitment by Member-States to more deeply address the unpaid care economy shouldered by women and girls. Additionally, a Second World Summit for Social Development has since been approved for 2025.







MELF Cohort 3 Embarks on NYC Immersion

The second immersion of Cohort 3 of the Mercy Global Action Emerging Leaders Fellowship is underway, taking place from March 6 to March 17 at the Mercy Global Action office in New York City, United States!

The theme for this immersion is "Empowering Women to Lead with Dignity". Fellows will be attending the 68th Commission on the Status of Women, as well as a number of other events at the United Nations and throughout the city.



As the Fellows embark on this journey of learning, advocacy and discernment, we pray that they are renewed in collaborative energy and empowered to lead with wisdom and dignity in their own communities and beyond. May the special energy generated during this time be amplified throughout the Mercy World to fill us all with hope and inspiration.




